Manchester Festival of Social Science 2023 in Review

The 2023 festival took place throughout October and November with 16 events taking place on and off campus, 10 of which responded to this year's festival theme of *Lifelong Wellbeing* which ties in with our challenge led theme of *Healthy Living* in Salford's Innovation Strategy. 935 people attended the festival in total comprising the general public, university staff and our partners.

Our festival events covered a range of topics sharing research from our School of Health and Society and Salford Business school, these included; Wellbeing and Older Women at Work, The Power of Nature in Enhancing Wellbeing, Neurodiversity in the Criminal Justice System, Celebrating Communities of Kindness, Salford Photo Stories, and the Relationship between Gardening for Wellbeing and Asylum.

Our highlight event was *Barbara's Parlour*, a co production between Mark Croasdale Theatre and Salford's Dementia Hub and Associates which brought pop up theatre and song to Eccles Library exploring themes of care and people's relationships with dementia conditions.

<u>Barbara Lights up Manchester Festival of</u>

Being Human Festival 2023: The Anthropozine, Being Human in the Age of Zines.

Lecturers in English Prof. Jade Munslow Ong and Dr Emma Barnes, and Associate Dean Sam Ingleson were successful in receiving a total of £3,000 to run four events as part of the Being Human Festival, the UK's national festival of the Humanities. To respond to this year's theme, 'Rhyme and Reason', the team turned to the form of the 'zine', which has historically been used for both creative (rhyme) as well as political (reason) purposes.

Workshop inspired by DRUM magazine at Salford Museum and Art Gallery

From 11th -16th November, the team hosted four zine-making workshops as a means to share their research with the public. The workshops were inspired by *DRUM* magazine, a South African literature magazine, *Opportunity*, a magazine originating from the Harlem Renaissance, *Equal Rights*, a feminist magazine, and music zines that celebrated Manchester's music scene. These workshops were hosted in collaboration with the Salford Zine Library, Salford Museum and Art Gallery, and Partisan at Islington Mill.

Published Surrealist Collaborative Novel is 'Everyday Marvelous'

Prof. Ursula Hurley and Dr Stephen Sunderland came together last month with Salford Loaves and Fishes to celebrate having a new collaborative novel published. 'Alsdorf is an adventure from Salford's dream-other where queens hide and a fly morphs into a supernova'. The new book is the output of the 'Everyday Marvelous' project.

This project was funded by additional QR money internally from the University, allowing the exploration of potential of 'surrealist', 'avant garde' and 'anti-traditional' creative writing techniques to promote well-being. It offered a series of accessible workshops at 'Salford Loaves and Fishes', a drop-in centre which supports the homeless, isolated and vulnerable in the local community.

Led by Salford PhD alumnus, Dr Stephen Sunderland, the project exceeded all expectations, culminating in a cocreated surrealist automatic novel published by Hesterglock Press. Set in the world of Alsdorf, Salford's dream other, one reviewer described it as:

"You don't know where you are? This novel will tell you. Its authors a band of seizing geolocators that come into being through the kindest, darkest collective automatism. Imagine Salford sucked into a pinprick in the ground, and then inverted, usurped by a new place in the process. Here is Alsdorf, where you've been sent in the dream of surrealism come to pass a century on. What should be praised more? The way this novel has come into being, a testament to the open heartedness that can drive the curiosity of complexity? Or the text itself, groundbreaking, illustrative, rich and weird? Folkloric, luminous, ravenous and completely original, this is a piece of literature unlike anything else." - SJ Fowler

Following the success of the engagement project, at the Bank Top exhibition launch on 2nd November, each young participant was awarded their own camera, enabling them to continue expressing themselves through the powerful medium of photography.

The impact of the programme is evident in the words of Teagan, one of the young participants, who reflects on the exhibition, "Looking through a camera lens and taking a picture of what it really makes it look better than what it actually is, but when you take that camera away, you realise how beautiful it is just standing there."

Alongside the Craig Easton: Is Anybody Listening? exhibition tour, the Our Time, Our Place engagement programme has connected young people, local to each exhibition venue to explore the exhibition themes. In Salford, the programme has successfully engaged 12 local young people aged 11-16 years through Salford Youth Service since June 2023.

Guided by socially-engaged photographer Gwen Riley-Jones, the young participants have been actively involved in weekly evening sessions at the Little Hulton Family Hub. Armed with cameras and a newfound passion for photography, they have explored their local surroundings, honed their photography skills, learned the art of curating exhibitions, and built meaningful connections with their peers.

Take part in Manchester Science Festival 2024

Our partnership with Science and Industry Museum continues. Producers from Manchester Science Festival 2024 have reached out to us. The Family Zones programmers are interested in your ideas and are involved in delivering the bulk of the daily festival offer on site at the museum, including the family zones and explainer activities.

They are looking to have partners confirmed by the end of January so now is the time to have conversations about your involvement!

Content development will take place from January - April, with logistics planning from May 2024.

Some context about the 2024 festival and timelines:

- Our 2024 theme is Extremes. The family zone is focused on two strands: The Future (Environments, Computing, Space, Tech) and Ourselves (extremes of human experience and performance)
- We're actively looking to increase our offer for EYFS (0-7y) and teenage (13 - 17) audiences.
- We're looking for facilitated stands with hands-on activities family groups can get stuck into together, which will be open daily between 18-27 October 2024.
- Our half day engagement course delivered by SMG Academy will be mandatory for all partners but all partners will have the benefit of attending a very good engagement course for free! This can be a couple of people from each research group, or all of them if there's appetite. Dates for those are either 6 March in person at the museum or 4 April online.
